I. **Call to Order**

Chair Cline called the meeting to order at 9 a.m.

II. **Roll Call**

**BACKGROUND:**

Each program in the Community and Technical College System is reviewed for viability every five years. Attached for Board review is a table with the summary recommendations and summary reports for the above programs.

Each program review document was presented to the Academic Standards Committee for edits and recommendations. The recommendation of the BOG will be presented to the West Virginia Council for Community and Technical College Education.

Synopsis of significant findings, including findings of external reviewer (s)	The CJ program meets the needs of the students in the valley and surrounding 5 county areas. It is cost-effective, and convenient. Chair of CJ program at WVSU, where most students transfer for a BS degree indicates that BVCTC students are better prepared for their junior year than those at WVSU.																																
Plans for program improvement, including timeline	The addition of more online courses may suit our students’ needs, according to the program Advisory Committee. To date, the Program Coordinator has completed Introduction to CJ as an online course, and Criminology as a blended (online and in seat) course, and offered them during the 2018 academic year. The planning for this is under way.  The advisory committee members discussed the possibility of offering summer internships. That is being explored currently. The feasibility of this endeavor is being discussed.																																
Identification of weaknesses or deficiencies from previous review and the status of improvements implemented or accomplished	No weaknesses were determined. Suggestions for improvement were the inclusion of laboratory equipment in order to teach forensic science courses. That task has been accomplished and we have incorporated 3 forensic sciences into the CJ curriculum. Completing those 3 courses, provides the students with a skill set in forensic science.

<p>Summary of assessment model and how results are used for program improvement</p>	<p>At the conclusion of each academic year, the criminal justice program coordinator completes a detailed assessment of the program and the courses within it. Courses are specifically analyzed on a rotating basis to determine effectiveness of outcomes for the course and program. According to this report, the courses meet the academic needs of the students in terms of general education as well as programmatic outcomes.</p>												
<p>Data on student placement (for example, number of students employed in positions related to the field of study or pursuing advanced degrees</p>	<p>Students who enter a field of law enforcement or state employment are required to undergo testing within that particular agency or organization. Students are therefore not “placed” in jobs. There are several students who are currently working for law firms in the region and the CJ program director has assisted in having them “placed” and employed in that field.</p> <p>According to a student poll conducted in the CJ capstone course, more than 50% of BVCTC’s students plan to pursue a baccalaureate degree upon completing their AAS degree. Representatives from WVSU, Marshall, and UC spend one day presenting information to the students in the Capstone course about transferability and scholarships available for transferring students.</p>												
<p>Recommendation</p>	<p>It is recommend BVCTC keep the AAS in Criminal Justice, the Certificate in Criminal Justice and the Skill Set in Forensic Science. Statistics indicate increased need for educated individuals in the criminal justice field in order to fill employment needs.</p>

Name and Degree level of Program; Number of Hours required for graduation	Graphic Design and Print Communications-60 hours																																		
Synopses of significant findings, including findings of external reviewer(s)	Program course of study was changed during time covered by this review at suggestion of advisory board. The Graphic Design and Print Communication program has seen continued growth in enrollment since offering the program on the South Charleston campus. The enhancements and updates to the program including the addition of industry certifications, Package Design, and two flexography classes provide students with greater opportunities for employment in the graphic design and print communication field.																																		
Plans for program improvement, including timeline	Program needs an additional faculty member to grow beyond current enrollment. There is concern with not having a lab in South Charleston. Student transportation to the Montgomery campus is a limiting factor on student enrollment. Plan to work more closely with advertising course of study in the next year to enhance real world experiences.																																		
Identification of weaknesses or deficiencies from the previous review and the status of improvements implemented or accomplished	Overall enrollment is approximately fifteen students at this time. The introduction of industry certifications in Adobe products and the addition of a Packaging Design and two Flexography courses enhanced the program. One weakness is the Flexography lab equipment is located on the Montgomery campus which creates student transportation issues.

The Adobe certification passage rate was 100%, indicating students are meeting program outcomes and objectives.</p>

Students graduating from the Graphic Design and Print Communications program that have contacted us are either working in field or have pursued advanced degrees. As permitted by WV Code 18B-10-6A, institutions may grant student tuition and fee waivers not to exceed 5 percent of full-time equivalent students (FTE) registered the previous fall semester.

The Code stipulates that the "awarding of tuition and fee waivers" must be entered in the minutes of the Board of Governors annually.

The attached report is provided by the BridgeValley Office of Financial Aid for Academic Year 2018-2019, in compliance with this statute.
